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


"Thelma G. Van Hoosier was a woman who was deeply passionate for others, ensuring that



Free Advance Directive Presentations

An Advance Directive is a legal document in which a person specifies what actions should be taken for their health if they are no longer able to make decisions for themselves due to illness or injury. The *Five Wishes* is recognized as a legal Advance Directive in Hawaii and asks some very important questions such as "The Person I Want to Make Care Decisions for Me When I Can't".

It inspires a conversation with your family, friends, and doctor about how you want to be treated. Many of us are surprised to discover how helpful and interesting it is to create space to discuss "what matters in the end."

We also continue to host *Being Mortal* to raise awareness of the importance of talking about end-of-life preferences and goals with loved ones and medical professionals!


