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



# Hospice Maui Hale was truly a blessing for our family,

it allowed my husband Robert to live his last days with grace and dignity surrounded by those who loved and cared for him.

Robert was a humble Hawaiian man who was full of aloha. Born and raised in Hana he enjoyed his peaceful life there with his family and friends. He was a fisherman who shared his fresh catch, his home and his knowledge not only with the younger generations of Hana but with visiting canoe clubs, sports teams, school groups, sailing crews and many more.

During the year before his passing Robert had lived through months and months of doctors visits, scans, labs and tests. Then in late May he was diagnosed with cancer. It was devastating news but there was hope.

Robert was ready for whatever it

took and the journey continued. We would drive for hours in and out of Hana and flew from Hana to Kahului to Honolulu and then back again, over and over again.

Robert and I are raising two grandsons, it was always hard to leave them when we had to travel for Robert's many appointments. We missed the last days of one school year and then the first days of the next. Thankfully we had family and friends who were always there willing to help with the boys, but it was never easy being away from them. It was also tough when Robert would end up in a hospital that wouldn't allow any visitors because of Covid-19.

After several emergencies and ambulance calls
Robert thought it would be best to transfer his chemotherapy from
Honolulu to Maui. So we scheduled a visit to a well recommended oncologist here on Maui. Although we made it to the appointment the chemotherapy was taking a toll on Robert and we had to call an ambulance before the doctor had a

chance to see him. The doctor had me stay and fill out paper work so he could help Robert. He sat with me and explained Robert's condition and told me that he thought Robert should go into hospice. I had heard of hospice but didn't really know what it was or how it would help us.

Robert did get out of the hospital after that and spent several more days at home before another emergency and trip back to the hospital. Those days gave us time to talk and ask questions about Hospice Maui. Robert's main concern was that we could be together and that he could see our boys.

Just knowing that was possible helped him make his decision. Robert went directly from the hospital to Hospice Maui Hale. I packed up the boys and our things at home and drove in from Hana anxious and apprehensive not knowing what to expect.

The first thing that struck me when we got to the Hale was the sense of place. Where I was standing, this was sacred, I looked out over Maui and Haleakala and I felt peace. When I got to Robert he was resting in a nice cool room and had already gotten a lei from a caring staff

member. As the days went by and word got out that Robert was at the Hale a steady stream of family and friends were welcomed there Robert got to see the boys every day and had a chance to visit and spend precious moments with everyone who stopped by. Hospice Maui Hale gave us a place to just be together and be there for Robert. We watched the sun and full moon rises and held each other up witnessing the last days of a life so well lived. Robert's room and lanai were filled with love, laughter and tears, sweet Hawaiian music. fragrant and beautiful flowers, lei and lots and lots of goodies, a little bit of Hana at the Hale.

We were visited daily by staff who offered their help and answered our questions. The doctor visited every morning, he listened to our concerns and gave us advice. One of the most helpful things was a little blue book that was given to us, Gone from My Sight: The Dying Experience by Barbara Karnes. It was a comfort to our family and help in explaining this experience to all of us.

Robert was cared for by the most loving and friendly nurses. I will never forget the way Robert felt after his baths when the nurses would poor water over his back. That simple act meant so much to him. The nurses would bring him ice chips, extra blankets and pillows and always made sure he was comfortable. They worked hard to place IV's and moved his port to make everything as pain free as possible. Robert was cared for and comfortable and this allowed me to just be there with him. For that I am most thankful.

Robert's last days were as rich and full as his life had been for that we are grateful to the peaceful shelter of Hospice Maui Hale and its wonderful doctor, nurses and staff who embraced us with a warmth and reverence that honored the passing of this wonderful man who we all love so much.

# Compassionate Hospice Care

We believe that at the end of our lives we are entitled to care that helps to relieve pain and other symptoms.

We each deserve to be cared for by those who understand the emotional and spiritual needs of the dying. We deserve the opportunity to express our hopes and fears, and to be heard, honored, and supported; and we are each entitled to live our last months and weeks in the setting of our choice, treated according to our beliefs and values

#### Hospice Maui Hale

Many families have the need for 24-hour care near the end of life of a loved one. Our five-bedroom hale provides a homelike residence that offers a beautiful balance between privacy and community living, when spending their last days at home is not an option.

#### Bereavement Support

Hospice Maui offers free bereavement support to family members for at least a year after their loved one dies on our service. Those support services include periodic phone calls, personal letters, specialized newsletters, and group events. In addition, we provide to the general public weekly grief support groups facilitated by licensed professional counselors.

Special grief workshops, community education and services, an annual Holiday Open House, and an annual Memorial Day Service are also offered.



# Caring for Maui County

The first week of February was the mark of a memorable milestone for Hospice Maui. We now provide hospice services to the communities of Maui, Moloka'i and Lana'i. It was Greg LaGoy's vision to expand our compassionate and professional services to all of Maui County and we made that a reality.

We welcomed longtime Moloka'i team members Barbara Helm, Bereavement Coordinator, Patty McCartney, Social Work Assistant, and Maile Silva, Hospice Aide to our 'Ohana. Currently, we serve patients on Moloka'i and Lana'i as we grow our teams, build relationships with our community partners, and learn how we can best support the Moloka'i and Lana'i communities. The nonprofit's new Molokai office is located at the Molokai Community Health Center Complex in Kaunakakai and our Lanai office is located at Lanai Kina'ole in Lanai City. In addition to hospice care, we also offer bereavement services to all Maui County residents.
